

#### NEWS FROM THE MCAA

I hope you are all safe and doing well.

Over the years, one aspect that has always fascinated me in the MCAA community is our members' passion and resiliency. We are living in a challenging time and for MCAA it is no different. Here a short update of how MCAA and the Chapters are trying to tackle the current time of crisis.

In times of physical distancing, several MCAA Chapters and Working Groups have quickly adapted to the virtual environment. In 2020, MCAA has organized over 160 events worldwide about relevant topics in academia, such as proposal writing, mental health of researchers, and science communication among others.

In March 2021, our flagship event the "Annual Conference" and the General Assembly were held virtually for the first time. The experience was a success. The three-day conference had 15 parallel sessions and many interesting keynotes about "Research in time of crisis". Among our invited speakers were the European Commissioner Mariya Gabriel, the Science Europe General Secretary Lidia Borrel-Damien, the Chair of the European Commission's Chief Scientific Advisor Group Prof. Nicole Grobert, the CEO of American Association of Advanced of Science Dr. Sudip Parikh, and the President Elect of International Science Council Sir Peter Gluckman.

Offering career development opportunities to our member has always been a priority for MCAA. During the pandemic, the need for such training increased. As a reaction to the increasing demand, in 2020 MCAA started the initiative "MCAA Learning". ### **MEMBERS' CORNER**

In this special COVID-19 issue, we would like to introduce a member whose work and project is contributing to a safer and healthier life for all of us. Katarzyna Slipko is a PhD candidate at the Vienna University of Technology:

"In 2020, my work took an unexpected turn: we shifted our focus from investigating antibiotic resistance in wastewater to development and implementation of wastewater monitoring for SARS-CoV-2 virus. Wastewater surveillance is a well-known tool for control of various viral diseases (e.g. polio). After the KWR Water Research Institute (the Netherlands) successful study, we decided to follow their steps. They reported that "sewage surveillance could be a sensitive tool to monitor the circulation of the virus in the population." This fuelled our work – to find a fast and simple method to monitor SARS-CoV-2 outbreaks in chosen populations by investigating wastewater.

One of the main project difficulties was developing the methodology while simultaneously implementing it to analyse samples. At first, we focused on Vienna and surroundings, however, very quickly the number of incoming samples grew until we were covering the majority of the hotspots in Austria. The project grew into "Coron-A" consortium with AGES and Innsbruck Universities sharing their forces.

We worked on developing the method by trying various procedures: different types of sample preparation, ways of virus concentration and detection. The main methodology tests were finished at the end of July and we could focus on increasing our capacity and implementing routine monitoring plans for chosen hotspots.

The data that we collected helped to monitor and predict COVID-19 outbreaks in Vienna and other chosen places in Austria. We could see how the signal in wastewater increased with the spread of the virus over time. In many instances, we were able to predict a rise in cases, up to a week before they were confirmed. During lockdowns, we could see a plateau in the curve and cases slowly going down.,



The project is still ongoing and has attracted the attention of the Austrian media. More information can be found here:
